TODAY WE WELCOME REVEREND BILL STANFIELD TO WESTMINSTER

Rev. Bill Stanfield is a founder and CEO of Metanoia. Bill loves reading, writing, exercising and spending time with his family. He and his wife, Rev. Evelyn Oliveira (a co-founder of Metanoia with Bill) have two sons.

About Metanoia: In 2002, the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of South Carolina (CBFSC) desired to invest in transformative efforts to address childhood poverty within the state. CBFSC's coalition of churches hired Urban Ministers Evelyn Oliveira and Bill Stanfield to spend a year listening to residents and leaders within South Carolina's North Charleston neighborhoods with the highest concentration of childhood poverty (per 2000 US Census).

Collectively, CBFSC decided to focus its efforts on Chicora-Cherokee in North Charleston, a small community of under 3,000 people. To Evelyn and Bill, Chicora-Cherokee was, most importantly, a vibrant place, resilient, and fundamentally strong. Many residents and families had lived in the neighborhoods for generations and aspired to continue to build the community for future generations. Metanoia was born out of this year of listening and maintains to this day a deep commitment to listening to neighborhood residents and families, who hold the true expertise about community challenges, aspirations, and solutions.

Metanoia seeks to amplify opportunities for a thriving community with families in Chicora and surrounding historically Black neighborhoods by honing the unique assets that exist here. Their efforts focus on Youth Leadership, Affordable Housing, and Economic Development.

YOU'RE INVITED! ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Anchor Class: This class emphasizes fellowship, good discussion, and growth. For 12 weeks, they will be studying the Gospel of Luke using J.I. Packer's series entitled "Knowing the Bible." Class is led by David Jump and meets in Room 15 of the Education Building.

The Cary Grayson Class: This class is facilitated by a team of leaders that engage in a study and reflection of the Bible. The current book being reviewed is 2 Samuel. A variety of outlooks are always welcome! Class meets in Room 4 of Covenant Hall.

The Life Class: We are going to dive into the book of Jonah. For 6 weeks, we'll see ourselves in the story of the reluctant prophet who just had to do things his own way. Emphasis is on fellowship, prayer, study, and learning how to study the Bible. This class is led by Pastor Daniel and Lindy Coleman. It meets in the Church Parlor.

Facing Racism:

Limited to 12 participants for 6 weeks. Participants will learn about racism in the context of Christianity through curriculum designed by PC-USA. This class is full.

READ GOOD BOOKS IN 2025!

Join Pastor Daniel in reading any (or all!) of these books in 2025. A variety of topics, authors, and genres, the choices are designed to stimulate the heart and mind and be a catalyst for growth in discipleship. Read each in preparation for the group discussion at 5:00 p.m. on the 4th Sunday of every other month. Books may be purchased online or at church (\$10 for *Jesus and the Disinherited*)

- On February 23rd we'll discuss Howard Thurman's landmark book, *Jesus and the Disinherited*. Thurman was the first to claim that Jesus Christ – who was born in poverty as part of a powerless minority – lived a life that spoke directly to Black Americans. Martin Luther King, Jr. not only regularly attended Thurman's services, but he carried Thurman's writings with him on the historic marches to Selma and Birmingham. King found Thurman to be a treasure and often drew from him in his own speeches and writings. Congressman John Lewis called Howard Thurman the "patron saint" of the Civil Rights Movement.
- On April 27th we'll discuss Dietrich Bonhoeffer's *Life Together*.
- On June 22nd we'll discuss Peter Aelred's *To Melt a Golden Calf*.
- On August 24th we'll discuss C.S Lewis's *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe*.
- On October 26th we'll discuss John Mark Comer's *The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry*.
- In December (date TBD) we'll discuss Fleming Rutledge's *Advent*.
